## TOUR DESCRIPTIONS

### Cargo Tour

**Thursday, June 28**

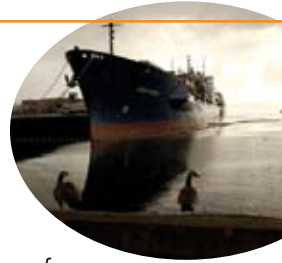
Seattle's seaport is a major gateway for two-way trade with Asia. Learn about the Port's cargo operations, trading partners and jobs on the docks. Containers, cranes, trucks and rail comprise a billion dollar business that generates 18,000 jobs and benefits our entire region. Tour will stop at Jack Block Park for a bird's eye view of Terminal 5 and a look at how a terminal expansion program benefited a local community.



### Trident Seafoods/Terminal 91 Tour

**Thursday, July 12 — (Government issued photo I.D. required.)**

The Port first built piers at Smith Cove in 1913. Today, Terminal 91 is a 152-acre facility with deep water piers that are home to the North Pacific at-sea processing industry. Learn about this vital industry and tour Trident Seafoods, a major U.S. seafood harvesting and processing company. Guests will also learn about the Port's future development plans for the terminal.



### Fishermen's Terminal Tour

**Thursday, July 19**

Fishermen's Terminal, homeport of the North Pacific fishing fleet since 1913, features moorage and a variety of services for large and small fishing and work boats. In addition to restaurants, retail shops and public access, the Terminal also is home to the Fishermen's Memorial, which commemorates those who have lost their lives while fishing. Guests will learn about today's fishing fleet and the \$22 million upgrade now under way to service one of Seattle's oldest industries.



### Shilshole Bay Marina Tour

**Thursday, July 26**

Shilshole Bay Marina is known as the Sailing Capital of the Northwest, providing boaters with prime access to Puget Sound. A 4,000 foot breakwater keeps the marina calm and protected with monthly moorage for 1,500 boats. Guests will see the progress of a three-year, \$80 million renewal project underway for new docks, new marina building, restaurant, children's fountain and public spaces with spectacular views of Puget Sound.
