# **Highline Heritage Museum Displays**

The Highline Heritage Museum has curated a set of 75th Anniversary displays for SEA Airport near Skybridge 1. Visit the museum in Burien to see a replica of the giant sloth uncovered during runway construction in 1963.

#### **Art Deco Elevator**

This elevator on the Mezzanine level south of Checkpoint 3 is one of the last remaining original pieces from the 1949 building. With minor renovations to keep the elevator operating, the design elements remain the same.

### Fossils – The oldest things in the airport

Trapped in limestone columns and walls throughout airport are fossils from the Jurassic period. About 155 million years ago, these critters lived in what is now Germany.

# **Central Terminal**

#### **1949 Dedication Plaque**

More than 30,000 people attended the official dedication ceremony for Seattle-Tacoma International Airport (SEA), when this plaque was first unveiled.

#### Window Wall

This iconic window wall makes you feel like you're on the airfield, and in 1949 you would have been! Planes would have been parked right where you're standing now.

#### **York Factory A by Frank Stella**

Acquired in 1972, *York Factory A* is the airport's oldest art acquisition on display.

## Flying Fish by Judith and Daniel Caldwell

Can you spot the one with luggage? Flying Fish by Judith and Daniel Caldwell was installed in 1999. There are over 50 different species represented, but only one that carries a suitcase.

#### C Concourse:

#### Point of Origin, Tides by Emily Tanner-McLean

As one of the first video art pieces ever installed at SEA, Tanner-McLean's work is making history. *Point of Origin, Tides* is a visual tapestry woven from close-up video clips of Coast Salish intertidal species at the Marine Science Center in Port Townsend, WA.

#### D Concourse:

#### Cow on its Side by Dick Weiss

Glassblowing has a long history in the PNW. Artist Dick Weiss represents that well with his 1988 stained glass window, which was also created in the in a similar manner to works from 600 years ago.

#### N Concourse:

#### Gate N7

Filmed in the early 90s, Sleepless in Seattle was an instant Rom-Com Classic. SEA holds a little part of that history when Tom Hanks' character sees Meg Ryan's character for the first time at N7. N Concourse is even more swoon worthy now after upgrades were completed in 2021.

## **Canopy** by Krista Birnbaum

Krista Birnbaum brought the first biophilic artwork to SEA. *Canopy* uses preserved mosses and stylized branch forms to reference the epiphyte-covered tree canopy of Pacific Northwest rainforests.

# **S** Concourse

#### Oscar the Al Trash Sorter

Representing just one example of SEA's long history of sustainability, Oscar is making history after being installed in multiple locations at the airport in 2023. Oscar helps passengers understand how to sort their waste into the correct compost, recycling, or trash bins.
