Bell Street Pier Cruise Terminal at Pier 66

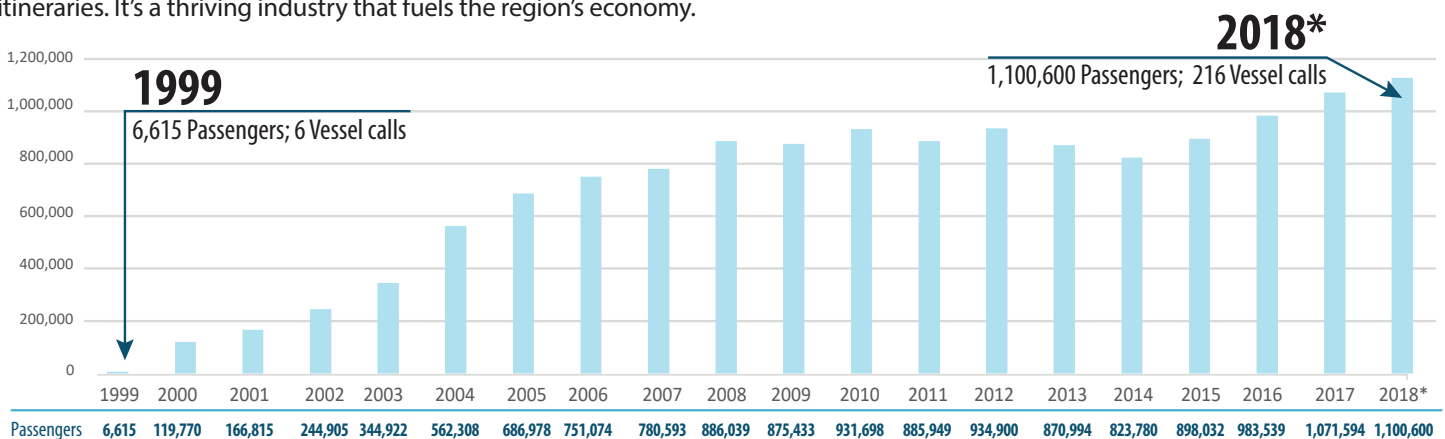
Pier 66 anchors an 11-acre vibrant, multi-use complex along Seattle's downtown waterfront.
