Traveler updates on coronavirus response



On January 21, 2020, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Washington State Department of Health announced the first case of 2019 Novel Coronavirus in the United States in Washington state. While U.S. public health officials currently believe risk for infection is low in our community, the Port of Seattle and our airline tenants are taking actions to keep travelers safe.

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The Port follows the guidance provided by public health experts at the federal Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Customs and Border Protection (CBP), United States Coast Guard, Washington State Department of Health, and Public Health-Seattle & King County during any public health incident. In addition to supporting federal agencies that operate at the airport we are:

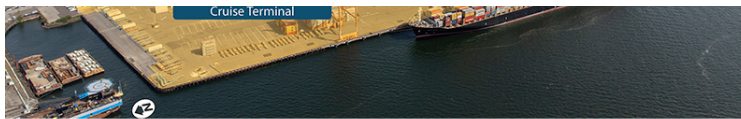
- Increasing our use of disinfectant and cleaning in what we call “high touch” areas at the airport, like handrails, escalators, elevator buttons, restroom doors, etc with an emphasis where international travelers arrive.
- Making hand sanitizer available to passengers throughout the airport.
- Coordinating with our airline and tenant partners, passengers, and employees to closely monitor any change in the status of our region’s health.

Port includes more environmental benefits in updated cruise RFP





The Port of Seattle released a [revised Request for Proposal \(RFP\)](#) to short-listed proposers being evaluated as potential investment and operating partners for the proposed new cruise facility. The revised RFP includes new language requiring cruise vessels to be equipped with shore power and connect while at berth as well as practices to require cargo handling equipment to have zero tail-pipe emissions, further participate in regional air quality planning, protect water quality by prohibiting discharges, and build sustainably. The Port could potentially announce a partner for the terminal by the second quarter of 2020.

Community, Port celebrates Duwamish Community Benefits Commitment

Recognizing that some near-Port communities, such as the Duwamish Valley, experience a higher proportion of environmental impacts and lack equitable access to the Port's benefits to the region, the Port of Seattle, Duwamish Valley community members, and health equity non-profit, Just Health Action, launched a pilot project in 2017. This past weekend, this project culminated in a public reveal of Resolution 3767, the Duwamish Community Benefits Commitment. This is the first policy at a Port authority that commits to partnering with community members on environmental justice issues. We worked with members of the Duwamish Valley Port Community Action Team to co-create this historic policy that addresses Port-community capacity building, promotes a healthy environment and community, and fosters economic prosperity in place in the Duwamish Valley.
