Acceleration of noise insulation efforts to benefit airport communities

Sound insulation projects for homes, apartments, condominiums, and places of worship in neighboring Seattle-Tacoma International Airport communities will now be completed in

less than half its current schedule. The Port of Seattle Commission approved the acceleration of these projects, which will now be completed in seven years, half the time originally expected. The projects were originally not expected to be complete for another 15 years.

Noise insulation near the airport is typically funded with approximately 80 percent in grants from the Federal Aviation Administration and 20 percent funding from the Port of Seattle's airport revenues. Noise insulation for impacted schools comes from FAA grants, Port airport revenue, the Port's property tax levy, and school district bonds approved by local voters.
