

JOB OPPORTUNITIES WITH TERMINAL 117 CONSTRUCTION

PRE-APPRENTICESHIPS AND APPRENTICESHIPS

The Port of Seattle will construct a public park and salmon habitat area along the Duwamish River in South Park. The project, Terminal 117, will hire union members in the skilled trades to construct it. The construction project will last Summer 2020 to Winter 2021.

To join a union, you can begin your training as a "Pre-Apprentice" with the ANEW program, or you can contact a union directly to learn how to start as an "Apprentice."

ANEW'S PRE-APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

Who they are

ANEW, a non-profit organization, offers pre-apprenticeship training programs that help individuals obtain careers in construction trades. The training programs is an 11-week, 3-days-a-week commitment. Trainings take place in Kent or Seattle. The program helps adults gain the knowledge, physical, and technical trades skills needed to be competitive, successfully apply, and be accepted into an apprenticeship. Trainees will learn about 10-12 different skilled trades, including those listed below. The trainings are unpaid, but at the end, you receive three certificates that make you competitive for an apprenticeship.

To enroll, you must attend an online 20-minute info session and email your completed enrollment form from the website.

Basic eligibility

- 18 years of age or older
- GED or High School Diploma (or ability to finish before end of program)
- Valid WA State Driver's License (or ability to reinstate license by end of program)
- Reliable transportation
- Ability to pass a drug test

TERMINAL 117 CONSTRUCTION-RELATED UNIONS AND APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAMS



CEMENT MASONS & PLASTERERS, LOCAL 528

Who they are

The union represents cement masons and plasterers who place and finish concrete according to specifications on roads, buildings, homes, sports arenas, and bridges.

About the Apprentice Program

- Cement Masons and Plasterers are four-year programs in which an apprentice attends four weeks of training in the classroom at the Training Center in Georgetown.
- To try out for the Apprenticeship Program, applicants must meet minimum qualifications, turn in a completed application, and receive an email or letter invite for the Try Out event from the Apprenticeship.

Note: Due to COVID-19, the Cement Masons and Plasterers spring quarter apprenticeship classes have been postponed until a later date.

LABORERS, LOCAL 242

Who they are

Construction Craft Laborers are the most diverse craft in the industry. They perform critical functions on commercial construction sites, including:

- Clean and prep construction sites
- Eliminate possible hazards
- Mix and place concrete
- Set braces to support the sides of excavations
- Tend equipment
- Saw or core concrete
- Demolish and remove structures and buildings
- Assist other craft workers (e.g., carpenters, plasterers, operating engineers and masons)

About the Apprentice Program

While taking the course, students will receive free housing, meals, training and job placement and a paycheck. No upfront skills or knowledge are required, and the training center campus is in Kingston, Washington.

Apprenticeship is the best way to start your career as a carpenter. Whether you have experience on a job site or have never used tools before, apprenticeship programs are designed to give you the skills for success. Each program is designed for on-the-job skills and puts you on the job site immediately. Most apprenticeship programs last four years giving you "journey" status upon completion with high-earning potential.

OPERATING ENGINEERS, LOCAL 302

Who they are

The International Union of Operating Engineers is a trade union that primarily represents:

- Operating engineers who work as heavy equipment operators
- Mechanics and surveyors in the construction industry
- Stationary engineers who work in operations and maintenance in building and industrial complexes and service industries

About the Apprentice Program

- This is an "Earn While You Learn" type of program with wages starting around \$29+ per hour plus a good benefit package.
- As a full-referral union, you don't have to look for a job—they do that for you.
- The selection process takes several months to

complete. Those who score the highest in related background and the interview may be invited to participate in a Safety and Orientation week at their Training Center located in Ellensburg. The Safety and Orientation week is an opportunity for applicants to get to know the trade and for our staff to evaluate the applicants. Before attending school or becoming indentured, an applicant must submit the provided medical release form completed by a doctor and pass the provided drug screening urinalysis test.

The 2021 entry-level apprentice class deadline is November 13, 2020. Apply online now. Selected applications will begin training April 2021.

TEAMSTERS (TRUCK DRIVERS) LOCAL 174

Who they are

The Washington Construction Teamsters Apprenticeship Program is a 3,000-hour, on-the-job training program covering a variety of Teamster Construction Equipment, including truck and pup, dump trucks, and belly dumps.

About the Apprentice Program

- Students will work on construction sites and learn the trade from qualified journey person teamsters.
- Students will attend supplemental related training of at least 144 hours per year.
- Classes usually begin in the spring (One to three classes per year). Apprenticeship classes are followed by on-the-job training.
- Students are not paid for attending the 6-week training class. If you are outside the Tri-Cities dispatch area, you are provided \$350 a week to help with travel expenses. Students are paid for the 3,000 hours of onthe-job training.

Note: Due to COVID-19 the Teamsters Training Center is currently closed and there will not be any classes in 2020; 2020 students will be trained in 2021. There may be a few open spots in 2021 (if any 2020 students have dropped out of the class).

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What documentation is typically required for enrolling in an apprenticeship?

Each union has its own enrollment forms, which you can find on their websites. Many applications require photocopies of: a valid driver's license, a Social Security card or other I-9 documentation, a high school diploma or equivalent, official transcript of GED.

Can foreign nationals work with unions?

A Social Security Number or I-9 document is required to join most unions. If your employer challenges your social security status, you should view the <u>KNOW YOUR RIGHTS handout</u>.



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
