


Washington is a Huge Supply Chain State

72,700 workers were employed in other industries in various roles and capacities, up from 62,800 in 2017.

These include 10,300 in aerospace, 4,000 in other manufacturing operations in the state, and an estimated 30,500 in e-commerce, primarily at Amazon but also at other businesses such as Zulily, based on custom analysis for this report


