Building Port-Related Careers in the Duwamish Valley



Dear Friends,

The Duwamish Valley community has long faced unique barriers to economic opportunity, despite living at the center of our region's trade, travel, and transportation infrastructure. Previous Port-funded initiatives like the <u>Duwamish Valley Green Jobs Program</u> worked with residents to build skills in environmental and habitat stewardship but also highlighted a need for clearer pathways to actual employment.

To address this need, the Port of Seattle recently launched Career Navigation Services, connecting job-seekers to the port-related industries of aviation, maritime, green industries, and the skilled trades and providing clear, equitable pathways to family-wage careers. Through personalized coaching with wraparound support — including assistance with training and application costs, work gear, and transportation — Career Navigation Services gives job-seekers the tools and resources they need to succeed.

Led by TRAC (Training, Rehabilitation, Assessment, Counseling) Associates and funded by the Port, Career Navigation Services provides one-on-one support to community members to overcome barriers and take the next step toward meaningful employment. Whether it's career exploration, direct employment opportunities, preparing for a pre-apprenticeship program, or enrolling in an existing training program, the service is designed to meet people where they are and create a personalized roadmap to success.

This initiative reflects the Port's broader <u>community benefits commitment</u> to advance equity and environmental justice in the Duwamish Valley and address Port operations that impact this community. By investing in workforce development, the Port is reducing barriers, expanding opportunities, and ensuring residents can access stable, well-paying jobs while continuing to live,

work, and thrive in their community.

TRAC Associates brings decades of experience in training, rehabilitation, assessment, and career counseling, and is now in the discovery phase of working directly with Duwamish Valley residents. A <u>community launch event</u> is planned for November 5 from 4 to 6 p.m. at the Duwamish River Community Hub (8600 14th Ave S, Seattle, WA 98108) to celebrate the program's start and connect more people to these opportunities. <u>Learn more about the program</u> and how to connect with a Career Navigator.

By connecting residents to real opportunities, the program builds careers that support families, strengthen neighborhoods, and create a lasting impact for generations to come.

Port of Seattle Commission reaffirms commitment to immigrant communities and international visitors



On October 28, the Port of Seattle Commission unanimously adopted an updated Welcoming Port Policy Directive, reaffirming the Port of Seattle's commitment to ensuring that all people — regardless of immigration status — are treated with dignity, respect, and fairness across all Port facilities. The updated policy adds direction to Port employees regarding immigration-related activities on Port property — from prohibiting the use of time or resources to support civil immigration enforcement unless required by law to providing clear steps to respond to immigration-related inquiries. It also ensures that individuals with limited English proficiency have meaningful access to services and that personal information is protected against unauthorized disclosure.
